Greetings First District, we are already to February, which the first Sunday is Four Chaplains Sunday.

"Have we not all one Father? Hath not one God created us? Why do we deal treacherously every man against his brother, by profaning the covenant of our fathers?" **Malachi 2:10**. This inscription is at a school in York, PA where Rabbi Goode presided. There is a ceramic tile mural that bears the likeness of all four chaplains, with the identical inscription under each. One in Hebrew, one in Latin, and two in English.

The USAT Dorchester was hit by a torpedo at 1255 AM, 03 February, 1943 and sank in approximately 27 minutes while enroute to Greenland, loaded with troops, civilian workers and supplies. The chaplains were Lt Carl V Poling, Dutch reformed, Lt George L Fox, Methodist, Lt John P washington, Roman Catholic, and Lt Alexander P Goode, Jewish. Can you imagine the thoughts and actions that took place on the deck. The chaplains moved among the troops, urging calm, stilling the panic, along with helping many people to safely get off the ship. They passed out as many life jackets as were there, then gave their own away to save a few more. Lt John Mahoney forgot his gloves. He later wrote" Chaplain Goode overheard me swearing at myself for my stupidity. When he saw me heading back to my cabin he called after me, 'Don't bother, Mahoney. 'I have another pair. You can have these.' He pulled off his gloves and gave them to me." He landed in a lifeboat that was awash and lasted for 8 hours. Without the gloves, he would have never made it. Two out of 40 in that lifeboat survived.

"Valor is a gift," Carl Sandburg once said. "Those having it never know for sure whether they have it until the test comes." That night, they passed life's ultimate test, and in doing so became an enduring example of extraordinary faith, courage, and selflessness. On 19 December, 1944, the next of kin were given the posthumous awards of the Distinguished Service Cross and Purple Heart by the commanding general of the Army Service Forces. A special Medal of Heroism, equal to the Medal of Honor and never before given and never to be awarded again, was authorized by the Congress and awarded by the President 18 January, 1961.

In February 1951, the Chapel of the Four Chaplains, an interfaith memorial chapel, was dedicated in Philadelphia PA. The opening was presided over by Reverend Daniel Poling, Chaplain Poling's father with President Truman in attendance. Please support the Chapel of the Four Chaplains if you are able. Their story gives one hope, and their heroism and selfless sacrifice needs to be remembered.

A prayer for the American Legion, O God, our Heavenly Father, as we seek by Your grace to be good Legionnaires, help us to do justice in all our ministrations to the sacred memory of all veterans of all wars, but more especially to give our all to eliminate the necessity of their being in days to come—those greater scourges by which people are beset today: poverty, addiction, disease and indifference toward the things of the Spirit. For we pray in Your holy name. Amen

A final thought, it is said that we make time and assets available for that which we truly value. Get out of your comfort zone, overcome your normalcy bias and make a difference.

The story

Early on Feb. 3, 1943, an enemy torpedo struck the Army transport *Dorchester* as it carried 902 officers and enlisted men, Navy armed guard, merchant seamen and civilian workers in the North Atlantic. The Coast Guard cutter escorts *Comanche* and *Escangha* rescued 230 men.

As Dorchester took on water, four Army chaplains – Lt. George L. Fox (Methodist), Lt. Alexander D. Goode (Jewish), Lt. John P. Washington (Roman Catholic), and Lt. Clark V. Poling (Dutch Reformed) – calmed frightened soldiers, aided the wounded and guided the disoriented toward safety.

On deck, they opened a storage locker and began distributing life jackets. When there were no more available, the chaplains removed their life jackets and gave them to four young men. "It was the finest thing I have seen or hope to see this side of heaven," said John Ladd, a survivor.

As the ship went down, men in rafts saw the four chaplains, arms linked and braced against the slanting deck, singing hymns and praying.

Congress attempted to confer the Medal of Honor on the chaplains but was prevented by strict requirements of heroism under fire. It authorized a one-time posthumous Special Medal for Heroism, awarded by President Eisenhower in 1961; it was intended to have the same weight and importance as the Medal of Honor.



Lt. George L. Fox

As a medical corps assistant during World War I, Fox was highly decorated for bravery and awarded the Silver Star, Purple Heart and the French Croix de Guerre.

Fox studied at Moody Institute, Illinois Wesleyan and Boston University School of Theology. He and his wife, Isadore, had two children. While serving as a pastor in Gilman, Vt., he joined Walter G. Moore American Legion Post 41. He also served as the Legion's state chaplain and historian.

Fox went on active duty Aug. 8, 1942, the same day his son Wyatt enlisted in the Marine Corps. He was assigned to the Chaplains School at Harvard and reported to the 411th Coast Artillery Battalion at Camp Davis in Holly Ridge, N.C.



Lt. Alexander D. Goode

Born in Brooklyn, N.Y., in 1911, Goode became a rabbi like his father. He applied to become a Navy chaplain in early 1941, but was not accepted. After Pearl Harbor, he tried again, this time with the Army, and received an appointment on July 21, 1942. He went on active duty on Aug. 9, 1942, and was selected for the Chaplains School at Harvard. He was assigned to the 333rd Airbase Squadron in Goldsboro, N.C. In October 1942, he was transferred to Camp Myles Standish in Taunton, Mass. He and his wife, Theresa, had one daughter.



Lt. Clark V. Poling

Clark attended high school in Poughkeepsie, N.Y., where he was student body president and a football halfback. He was ordained in the Reformed Church in America and served as pastor of First Reformed Church in Schenectady, N.Y. He and his wife, Betty, had a son, Clark Jr. When America entered World War II, he decided to become a chaplain. Talking with his father, who served as a chaplain in World War I, he learned that chaplains in that war had the highest mortality rate of all military personnel. On June 10, 1942, Poling was appointed a chaplain with the 131st Quartermaster Truck Regiment and reported to Camp Shelby in Mississippi. Two months after Dorchester's sinking, Betty gave birth to their daughter.



Lt. John P. Washington

Born into a poor immigrant family, Washington took a newspaper route to help support his family. He loved music and sang in the church choir. In seventh grade, he sensed a call to the priesthood.

Washington attended Immaculate Conception Seminary in Darlington, NJ., where he was ordained a priest in 1935. Shortly after the Pearl Harbor attack, he received his appointment as an Army chaplain. In June 1942, he was assigned to the 76th Infantry Division at Fort Meade, Md. In November 1942, he reported to Camp Myles Standish in Taunton, Mass., where he was reunited with Fox, Goode and Poling - his classmates at Chaplains School at Harvard.

How we remember them

Every year, American Legion posts nationwide commemorate the selfless acts of the Four Chaplains on or near Feb. 3, designated Four Chaplains Day by Congress in 1948. Through interfaith services, memorial ceremonies and other solemn events, members of the American Legion Family lead their communities in honoring the

chaplains and 668 other men who died when *Dorchester* sank.

Founded in 1951, the Chapel of Four Chaplains in Philadelphia encourages and supports these observances, and recognizes selfless service to community, nation and humanity through its Legion of Honor award program.



Suggestions for a Four Chaplains Day observance

Four Chaplains Day services vary in length and format, but all should tell the story of the chaplains' supreme sacrifice – and bring together people of diverse backgrounds and creeds in recognition of our common humanity.

- Invite representatives of different faith groups to participate. Clergy representing the faiths of the Four Chaplains is especially fitting.
- Ask your mayor or governor to issue a proclamation designating the first Sunday of February "Four Chaplains Sunday."
- Create a focal point, placing photos of the Four Chaplains, four red roses, life jackets, or four empty seats near the altar or podium.
- Include a candle lighting or wreath laying.
- Have a message that centers on the Four Chaplains and selfless service.
- Spread the word about your program through social media, local newspapers, and radio and TV stations. Encourage reporters to write an advance or follow-up story. Send copies to the Chapel of Four Chaplains for its archives.
- Collect an offering to support the work of the Chapel of Four Chaplains.





INFORMATION ON "BE THE ONE MISSION"

We know ALA members are playing a big role in supporting the Be the One mission. However, tying the phrase into a theme is diminishing the power of the words *Be the One*. We understand the tradition of having themes and we are not pointing fingers, punishing anyone, or assigning blame. However, our members may want to step back from using Be the One as a theme. Remember: This serious topic is not just an ALA focus, but an American Legion Family mission.

- Be the One is about suicide prevention and awareness.
- It originated as be the one to save one. It's estimated that between 17 and 22 veterans
 or servicemembers take their own lives each day.
- It's not a catchphrase. It's not a campaign. The American Legion is now calling it a
 mission.
- It's a mission to destigmatize asking for mental health support, provide peer-to-peer support and resources, and educate everyone on how they can Be the One.
- The American Legion Auxiliary and Sons of The American Legion joined The American Legion to promote the Be the One mission. So, ALA members should follow the guidelines from The American Legion. Go to BetheOne.org to learn more.
- The words "Be the One" should not be use as part of a lighthearted theme, to invite someone to a meeting, or to pay their dues. Uses other than suicide prevention/awareness diminish its power.
- Use of "Be the One" should be reserved for topics related to suicide prevention and awareness.
- The No. 1 issue facing the veteran community is suicide.
- The approved logos for Be the One are subject to the same usage rules as The American Legion brandmark.
- Think of Be the One as a standalone phrase such as "Just Do It" and "Got Milk".

How can you Be the One?


- Ask veterans in your life how they are doing.

PRESS RELEASES AND WHY THEY MATTER

Do you think that press releases are a thing of the past? Have you written off newspapers and moved to digital versions? Press releases are still a vital role in sending detailed information on upcoming events, holidays, and important news so don't write them off! Newspapers may not be showing up at your doorstep, but they are online! And there is a growing movement for more online local news. Don't count out television. Television stations have websites that often contain additional stories that may not have been used on-air. Continue sharing them with your local news outlets, posting them to your social media accounts, and sharing them with your communities.

Press releases are important. They provide the who, what, when, where, and why. Viewed as trusted sources of information, press releases allow you to build credibility with outside sources, thus resulting in news from the ALA being viewed by more and more over time.

There are a plethora of tools and resources that will help guide you in creating your press releases, but did you know that the ALA provides many press release templates that will make your job much easier? The PR toolkit on https://

www.alaforveterans.org is a great starting point for anyone who needs a little nudge in the right direction! There are templates for holidays such as Veterans Day, Memorial Day, and National Poppy Day[®]. They are available for you to customize to your units and departments so utilize them and send them in time for the news to be read and shared.



Press releases allow you to promote the American Legion Auxiliary through branding as you will include the ALA brandmark or emblem when submitting the release to your media outlets. You will want to include photos related to the release or note that photos will be available after the event. Do you have an upcoming ceremony planned and want to draw the viewers attention? Include photos! Most of us are visual readers when looking at a printed paper or scrolling through social media. Pictures grab our attention and draw us in, resulting in us reading the article or release associated with the photos.

Be sure to include a line or two describing the American Legion Auxiliary (ALA) in the closing of your press release. You can use what the ALA provides in the templates at www.ALAforVeterans.org and as shown below.

An important note about the press release templates on the ALA website. ALA National Headquarters is refreshing the press release templates! The above boilerplate is also getting a makeover! Before you write a press release, keep checking back to the website to see if the new releases are posted.

Want to grow your relationship with the media beyond the press release? Send them invites to all your events and always send pictures after events. Remember, reporters are busy. They may not be able to come to every event, so don't be offended if they don't come. Keep inviting them and sharing information.

Any donations to my project during my time as 1st district President will be divided between Believet and The Armed Forces Service Center.

Believet provides highly trained service dogs, free of charge, to disabled veterans, helping them lead more productive, independent lives. The dogs are specially-trained to perform mobility and psychiatric tasks. They can wake a veteran from a nightmare, ease their anxiety in a crowded place and provide comfort through companionship and physical contact. The dogs are custom-trained, the cost is around \$30,000 from start to finish and again no cost to the veteran.

The armed Forces Service Center is an "all-free" stop located at the Minneapolis/St. Paul International Airport for active-duty military personnel and their dependents, Reservists, National Guardsmen and Military Retirees and their dependents. It is supported by a volunteer workforce and contributions. They are not affiliated with the USO, and do not receive funds from the US Government. Since opening on November 22, 1970, over 1 million active-duty military personnel, dependents and retirees have passed through the Armed Forces Service Center.

SOME INFORMATION ON BELIEVET SERVICE DOGS

OUR PROGRAM

The Need

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs conducted a broad survey of recent veterans to gain better insight on their overall health. In raw numbers, it is estimated that a sobering 500,000 troops from the Gulf Wars alone have been diagnosed with PTSD, according to Miriam Reisman ("PTSD Treatment for Veterans: What's Working, What's New, and What's Next," U.S. National Library of Medicine, 2016).

PTSD can be described as a mental health condition that may result from experiencing or witnessing trauma. Symptoms include flashbacks, nightmares, severe anxiety, depression, and confusion. This condition—often accompanied by major depression and/or traumatic brain injury (TBI)—can make it difficult, if not impossible, to meet the normal demands of daily life. According to the Department of Veterans Affairs, 20 deployed veterans die by suicide every day in the United States (Office of Suicide Prevention, "Suicide Among Veterans and Other Americans, 2001–2014," 2016).

Our Response

Trained service dogs can provide an essential source of security, affection, and connection for our veterans. Believet™ dogs are custom-trained for mobility and psychiatric tasks. They can wake a veteran from a nightmare, ease their anxiety in a crowded public place, and provide comfort through companionship and physical contact. Our dogs also help keep veterans on a schedule because the dogs need care and attention on a regular basis.

These is a growing body of research and clinical evidence supporting the value of service dogs. Despite this, neither the Veterans Health Administration nor most private insurers pay for or provide reimbursement for psychiatric service dogs for people diagnosed with PTSD.

Believet[™] provides highly trained service dogs, free of charge, to disabled veterans, helping them to lead more productive, independent lives. A service dog provides a sense of security, greater independence, non-judgmental acceptance, affection, physical assistance, and peace of mind.

Our Dogs

Believet[™] service dogs transform the lives of veterans and their families. The dogs come from shelters, rescue groups, and generous individuals. The training process for the service dogs is as follows:

- 1. Over the course of 18 months, Believet™ cares for and trains our service dogs to become ADA-approved and certified. During this time the dogs live with a foster family.
- 2. Believet[™] matches a veteran with a service dog and provides additional training tailored to the veteran's individual needs. Together, the veteran and service dog participate in 120 hours of training, including public access training and testing. Believet[™] provides all equipment free of charge.
- 3. Graduation! Once training is complete, the dog and veteran graduate. The Believet™ service dog goes to live with the veteran.

Our Facility

Believet[™]'s training facility is located on 12 acres just 3 miles outside of Northfield, Minnesota, (45 minutes south of Minneapolis). Our facility is heated and air-conditioned, and includes indoor and outdoor training spaces, and fenced outdoor airing yards. We can accommodate a maximum of 25 dogs at capacity.



New resources are available for American Legion Family members to use in support of the "Be the One" initiative to reduce the rate of veteran suicide.

The web page (betheone.org) has been updated with a variety of resources. Among them:

A set of brochures available for download. One brochure is a PDF that can be used to educate agencies with mental health services, community partners, local government leaders and others about Be the One. The other brochure is a Word document that can be downloaded and customized for posts to use at suicide awareness events. The entire back page of the trifold is intentionally left blank (other than directions, which can be deleted) so that posts can fill it with local resources.

Branding materials: A variety of approved American Legion Be the One promotional materials that posts can use to promote the initiative.

Content, including the special two-part magazine series on Be the One. The series includes stories and snippets about how American Legion members and posts are actively participating in events geared toward reducing the stigma associated with mental health counseling.

Video links: Vimeo playlist includes videos that can be downloaded and played while offline. They can be shared on social media, posted to the web and played at post events. Additionally, headquarters staff has created <u>a QR Code</u> for the Be the One page. This can be used to direct others to find information and resources related to the campaign.

How to scan a QR code:

- 1. Open the Camera app on your phone.
- 2. Make sure you are using the rear facing camera.
- 3. Hold your device so the QR code appears in the viewfinder in the Camera app.
- 4. Once steady, your device will recognize the QR code and show a notification.
- 5. Tap the notification to open the link.
